- DPDP Act Awareness Session Organised for NCERT Officials to Strengthen Data Protection Practices

New Delhi, August 11, 2026: The National e-Governance Division (NeGD), Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY), conducted an Awareness Session on the Digital Personal Data Protection (DPDP) Act, 2023 and the DPDP Rules for officials of the National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) on August 11, 2026. The session, addressed by Mr. Soumavo Majumder, Data Privacy Expert, NeGD, brought together officials from Tamil Nadu, Puducherry, Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Karnataka, Lakshadweep and Kerala.

The session focused on creating awareness among NCERT officials about the key provisions of the DPDP Act and Rules and their relevance to the functioning of the organisation. The programme also provided practical insights into how data protection principles can be incorporated into existing processes and operations involving the collection, processing, storage and sharing of personal data.

The session covered key aspects of the DPDP Act and Rules, including the applicability and scope of the legislation, roles and responsibilities of Data Fiduciaries and Data Processors, obligations relating to the processing of personal data, consent and lawful processing, rights of Data Principals, security safeguards, personal data breaches, data retention and erasure and other important compliance requirements.

A key focus of the session was on the practical implementation of the DPDP Act within NCERT. Officials were sensitized to identifying personal data handled across various educational, administrative and departmental processes and systems, understanding the purpose for which such data is collected and processed, ensuring appropriate safeguards, managing access to personal data, reviewing data-sharing arrangements with third parties and service providers and establishing appropriate processes for responding to Data Principal rights and personal data breaches.

The session also emphasised that effective implementation of the DPDP Act requires a process-oriented and organisation-wide approach, with data protection considerations embedded into the design and delivery of digital services and administrative processes. Officials were encouraged to assess existing practices and identify areas where appropriate measures can be adopted to strengthen privacy, security and responsible handling of personal data.

This awareness programme is a part of broader awareness and capacity-building initiatives aimed at supporting government organisations in understanding and implementing the requirements of the Digital Personal Data Protection Act, 2023, and fostering a culture of responsible personal data management across public institutions.
